Students in the Junior section were required to deliver a six-minute prepared speech, while the bar was set at eight minutes for senior students. As well, students were given 15 minutes to prepare a three minute speech on one of three set topics. A considerable challenge! Our students formed almost 10% of students competing across SA and the NT, and acquitted themselves well. This was an excellent opportunity for students to develop their public speaking skills and confidence.

### Touch Football 10<sup>th</sup> May

Four keen and enthusiastic teams of students travelled to Mt Gambier to compete in the local rounds of Knock Out Touch Football. The first match was between our senior girls and a team from Tenison Woods College. This was a tough game, and, although the game was lost, the girls developed their skills throughout. Also facing Tenison Woods College, our senior boys came out victors in a tough match. The boys also won their second match, played against Grant High School. The afternoon began with the Year 8 and 9 girls going down to a team from Mt Gambier High School, but the boys came away with a convincing win.
