Throughout Term 4 Middle School students have been working on their \$20 Boss projects which is a program that support students in developing enterprise skills such as financial capability and problem solving.

Students started their journey conducting empathy interviews in the community to identify a need. Using the design thinking process students came up with a marketable idea to suit the needs of the community. Students were given a \$20 budget to create their business and had to document costings for all materials required for their idea, with it all coming to fruition at the recent market fete.

Held on Monday of last week, the fete was a great success, with a vibrant atmosphere.

Students took the responsibility of hosting a stall selling items they had designed and created through the \$20 Boss scheme. From jewellery, bath soaps, cookies, candles and much more, there were plenty of wares to help fill Christmas stockings, and stomachs!

Following the market, students worked on calculating the success of their business. The winning business, *Furry Tail Bandanas*, made a 85% profit, followed by *Savoury Collection* with a 69% profit. All students used this data to reflect on their product, meeting the identified need. Majority of students made a profit and all were able to recognise their business strengths and areas for improvement.

With students showcasing entrepreneurial skills and dedication through the project, they are to be commended on their efforts. We look forward to seeing the continued growth and success with these students, as they embark on future endeavours. All monies raised went towards a Big Day Out excursion to Mount Gambier.
